Intercultural Experience:		3-15 credits
Students have to complete an intercultural experience. This requirement is fulfilled through a semester-long study abroad experience, a faculty-led travel course, or an intercultural internship, which must be approved by the Coordinator for International Studies.		

Electives:	15-20 credits
Students must complete 5 electives from the International Studies course offerings of the Anthropology, Economics, History, and Political Science disciplines. Students cannot take more than 3 courses within one discipline. Only 1 course can be a lower-division (100 and 200-level) course. At least 4 must be upper-division (300 and 400-level) courses.
